The Achievement Center at Raritan Valley Community College (RVCC) is a three year, certificate based, post-secondary program

for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The Achievement Center offers:

- Peer mentors
- Academically inclusive and specialized classes
- Programmed campus engagement and career development

Student-centered design of both college and career plans, individualized strategies to meet the demands of college level Assignments, and removal of barriers to content, receptions and learning expression are central to each student's experience.



Academically inclusive and specialized classes include instruction in:

- Technology
- Liberal studies
- Campus engagement
- Employment strategies
- Social learning opportunities
- Interpersonal communication
- College assignment strategies

Academics

Achievement Center students access traditional RVCC courses in:

- Orientations
- College strategies
- Resource and library
- Chosen academic subjects
- Assessment tools for career development

Peer mentors are utilized for both academic and social support. Students have access to instructors before and after classes for additional instructional support as well as access to sessions to develop individualized organizational and answering strategies.

Each student learns differently and each student demonstrates their knowledge in various ways. Use of portfolio works, audio and outline form college-level assignments are all available to our students.

Employment

Students will have the opportunity to engage in career development through classroom presentations, service learning opportunities, and through work with actual assessments used in supported employment service models. The goal is to provide each student with the time and attention to aspire to a vocation, access the entry skills, and plan their approach toward a career.

Engagement

College is more than what you learn. It is who you meet, what you do and who you become. The Achievement Center and RVCC ask that each student engage with campus life in some way. Through sports, presentations, or subject matter interest groups, all students receive a Student Engagement Transcript detailing their activities in campus life. Our students pair with peer mentors or staff to begin this process of moving from spectator to participant in the area of their choosing.

"While Caryn did not have the chance to go to college right after high school, she was more than ready to take on the challenge when this program came along.
