



College Programs and Support Services 2018

What are College Programs?	They are specifically designed programs for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) that provide more in depth services and accommodations.		
What are College Support Services?	These are resources available at no cost for students with disabilities. Support services include reasonable accommodations, such as: note takers, extended time and preferential seating.		
How can I register with the Office of Special Services on a college campus?	The Office of Special Service provides continuing support to students with documented disabilities. Various support services are available to students according to their individual needs. The office is available to help students make a smooth transition to college as well as to succeed throughout their college experience. If students plan to apply for academic accommodations it's important to learn about the college's procedures in advance so you can receive assistive services and tools before class begins. Staff is available for individual appointments for academic counseling, scheduling, advisement, advocacy issues and determination of reasonable accommodations.

This gives the college administration the information and time they need to arrange for accommodations and services for your classes. Some examples:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Note takers, proofreaders • Textbooks in alternative form such as braille, large print and audiobooks • Access to educational materials in advance, such as class syllabus and study guides • Sign language, oral interpreting and real-time captioning services • Test taking alternatives such as; extended time or alternate test site <p style="text-align: center;">** Please note **</p> <p>A modification changes what a student is taught or expected to learn.
