

Community-based instruction is a research-based practice that involves the use of sustained and repeated instructional activities that take place in various natural community environments outside of the school building, in order to facilitate skill development and generalization in employment, community activities (e.g. shopping, banking, post office use) and recreation while addressing rigorous educational standards.


