

Extended School Year (ESY)

What is Extended School Year (ESY)? ESY Services are special education and/or related services provided beyond the end of school year.

Who is eligible for ESY?

- ESY Services are required to be available for all students with an IEP, including preschool students.
- ESY Services are required to be provided at no cost to the parents.
- ESY must be considered each year for every student with an intellectual and developmental disability.
- The IEP team determines eligibility for ESY services. THE IEP TEAM INCLUDES PARENTS OR LEGAL GUARDIANS.

ESY is Not:

- \Rightarrow A day care or respite service
- ⇒ A summer recreation program that isn't required to ensure the provision of a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) to a student.

How is eligibility determined?

Reliable sources of information to determine eligibility:

- Progress toward goals on the IEP and other progress reports.
- Observations made by parents or legal guardians, and teachers.
- Reports by parents or guardian of negative changes in adaptive behavior or other skill areas. (Adaptive behavior refers to the age-appropriate behaviors that people with and without learning disabilities need to live independently and to function well in daily life.)
- Changes in the student's medical, physical or sensory needs.
- Reports indicating a decline in progress that become worse during breaks in educational services.
- Results of tests including, but not limited to, criterion referenced test, curriculum based assessments.

What factors are considered?

Considerations:

- Regression & recoupment is the child likely to lose critical
 skills or fail to recover these
 skills within a reasonable time
- Degree of **progress** toward IEP goals and objectives
- Emerging skills/ breakthrough opportunities - Will a lengthy summer break cause significant problems for a child who is learning a key skill, like reading
- Interfering Behavior does the child's behavior interfere with his or her ability to benefit from special education
- Nature and/or severity of disability
- Special circumstances that interfere with child's ability to benefit from special education

How is ESY Delivered?

ESY Service delivery models may be 1:1 or group instruction.

- Services may be delivered in the student's:
 - Home
 - Community
 - In a classroom setting
- Don't wait until late in the school year to discuss your child's potential need for ESY services during the summer break. Request an IEP meeting just to talk about ESY.
